In art and design, the children will evaluate all of the time. Children will get the opportunity to talk, using artistic vocabulary, about their own artwork and that of others. Children will be taught to make suggestions on ways to improve and be involved in giving constructive feedback with increased sensitivity. They will enjoy sharing their opinions and listening to other's viewpoints and thoughts that may be the same or different to their own. They will acquire the ability to make informed, critical responses to their own work and that of others.
